Key Humanitarian Information This Week: (3)

1. New Israeli Displacement Orders:

The Israeli military issued three new evacuation orders affecting areas in the governorates of North Gaza, Gaza City, and Khan Younis, covering a combined area of 7.4 square kilometers.

- Since March 18, the Israeli military has issued 42 evacuation orders, subjecting approximately 279.5 square kilometers—or 76% of Gaza's territory—to displacement mandates.
- As of June 18, about 82.4% of Gaza's land was either within Israeli-designated military zones or under evacuation orders.



Telecommunications Outages Due to Infrastructure Damage:

On June 16 and 17, damage to fiber optic cables along the Khan Younis road caused a total internet blackout and disrupted mobile services in southern and central Gaza. This followed a complete outage in Gaza City on June 10, which spread across the Strip and was only partially restored.

- Telecommunications providers have warned that without immediate access to fuel and motor oil to power critical infrastructure generators, Gaza faces the imminent collapse of all internet and telecommunications services.



Severely Limited Rehabilitation Services:

The capacity for rehabilitation across the Gaza Strip is extremely limited, with an estimated 30,000 people in need of long-term rehabilitation support and only 85 rehabilitation beds available.

The number of injured children requiring medical care is overwhelming. Children account for: 23% of all amputations 26% of spinal cord injuries 33% of traumatic brain injuries 70% of surgical burn cases, Yet, there are no specialized rehabilitation



Key Risks Threatening the Sector:

Health Risks:

The number of individuals in need of prosthetics has risen to 6,000, including 4,000 new cases and 2,000 pre-existing cases. At least 292 patients—including 57 children—are awaiting stump revision surgeries.

- Thirty percent of inpatient beds at Gaza's only remaining specialized rehabilitation hospital (Al-Wafaa Medical Rehabilitation Hospital) are occupied by patients with advanced pressure ulcers.
- Individuals with pre-existing disabilities, chronic pain-related impairments, non-communicable diseases, and the elderly are at risk of worsening health conditions, leading to long-term disability and increased rehabilitation needs and costs.



Maternal Health Crisis:

Gaza is witnessing a severe maternal health emergency. Women are reportedly "starving, giving birth without clean water, sanitary conditions, or medical care."

- Half of the essential medicines for maternal care are depleted.
- No maternal health supplies, including life-saving medications, have been allowed into Gaza for over three months.



Critical Care Units at Risk Due to Fuel Shortages:

- 80% of essential critical care units for childbirth and medical emergencies are expected to shut down without fuel.

- Newborns in incubators and intensive care units face life-threatening risks due to failing life-support systems.

- 1 in 3 pregnancies is considered high-risk, and 1 in 5 newborns is either premature or underweight—both requiring specialized care that is becoming increasingly unavailable.

- Only five hospitals in the entire Gaza Strip continue to provide maternity care.



It should be noted that the Gaza Strip needs support in the following sectors:



Healthcare Sector

- 1 Fuel for hospitals
- 2 Medicines and medical supplies
- 3 Field hospitals
- 4 Supplies for safe childbirth in hospitals
- 5 Postpartum kits



Shelter Sector

- 1 Mattresses and blankets
- 2 Tents for IDPs
- 3 Cash intervention



Relief Sector

- 1 Food parcels, fresh bread and canned foods
- 2 Drinking water
- 3 Cooking gas
- 4 Clothing
- 5 Fuel for municipalities to operate water pumping stations
- 6 Cash intervention (Gaza and West Bank)
